Gospel Lesson Luke 16:19-31 (N.T., p. 79)

'There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table; even the dogs would come and lick his sores. The poor man died and was carried away by the angels to be with Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried. In Hades, where he was being tormented, he looked up and saw Abraham far away with Lazarus by his side. He called out, "Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am in agony in these flames." Welcome Guests and Visitors! We hope you already feel at home among us here at Stone Church. Please join us for refreshments and fellowship after worship.

We Welcome the sound of any little ones during worship, but if your baby (age 0-3) gets too wiggly for you, you may take them to the Nursery, located in the hallway between the Sanctuary & the Social Hall. It's open each Sunday for children ages 0-3 during wor-ship, and for ages 0-up during Adult Ed study classes (11-Noon).

Children's Sunday School – Children attend worship with their families, and then leave for classes after the children's sermon. Please pick up preschool children from Room A at 10:50. All other children will be re-leased at that time as well. Children's Classes are located east of the Social Hall, near the restrooms (Fireside & Preschool Rooms).

The Session of the Church has called a **congregational meeting** for **next Sun, Oct 2nd** immediately following worship. The purposes of the meeting are to:

- 1) Change the Stone Church by laws to reflect the wording the PCUSA Book of Order regarding the election and make-up of the congregation's nominating committee. Changes to the bylaws must be approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present.
- 2) Elect members of the nominating committee for the classes of 2023 and 2024.

The Retable Floral Arrangements are placed by the Worship Committee to continue the celebration of the Stone Church 75th anniversary.

The Peace & Global Witness Offering, will be taken **today**. Please use the envelope provided in the bulletin, or write *Peace offering* on the memo line of your check. This offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice across the world.

Roycott House Blessing & Walk Through – Immediately following worship **today** will be a last opportunity to see how the Roycott house looks after its many repairs and our donations of furniture and home goods. As of Oct 1st, this house (behind the church) will begin housing a refugee family from Afghanistan, so before the family moves in, the Rev. Evie Macway will lead us in a house blessing for its new purpose. We'll walk over and back in time for the Adult Ed Class (see below).

Adult Ed Class (11am SA) – **Refugee Resettlement with Jewish Family Services of Silicon**

Valley. JFSSV provides refugee resettlement and acculturation services for families and individuals in Santa Clara County, serving clients without regard to race, religion, ethnicity, or sexual orientation. **Debbie Michels** will describe their programs and answer questions about the resettlement process and the family who'll be renting Roycott House beginning Oct 1st. **Robin Feinman-Marino**, Volunteer Coordinator, will tell about JFSSV volunteer opportunities (below). To volunteer or for more info, go to www.ifssv.org.

- **Refugee Support** - The JFS SV resettlement program supports refugees from around the world who are starting new lives here in the Bay Area, specifically in Santa Clara and Alameda Counties. Volunteers work side-by-side with JFS SV staff to help our refugee clients in a variety of ways.
- **ESL Tutoring** - Experienced ESL teachers are needed to volunteer in our classroom, and who can commit a minimum of 1-2 hours per week for at least six months to work with beginning ESL students.
- **Career Mentors** - Our refugee clients have all levels of education and work experience in other countries and need guidance in finding their first U.S. job opportunities that fit with their backgrounds.

- **Drivers/Mass Transit** - Volunteer drivers are needed to help transport refugees to their medical, job interview and other appointments. Drivers must have a clean driving record and a car in good working order. Clients also need to learn how to use local mass transit.
- **Movers** - JFS SV provides all essential household goods and furniture to refugees when they move into their first permanent housing in the U.S. Volunteers are needed to help load furniture into U-Hauls, unload and move items into the new housing, and pick up and deliver donated items on weekdays and weekends.
- **Host Collection Drives** - Volunteers can host events to collect needed items for refugees, including toiletries, laundry detergent, Target gift cards and household items.
- **Donate!** - Contribute to the **Ruth Perkins Emergency Fund for Refugees.**

Human Trafficking Action Stand - Since 2016, a faithful group of folks have spent one-hour a month standing on Lincoln Ave. with signs calling attention to human trafficking. Human trafficking is the recruitment, transport, or transfer of persons using force, fraud, or coercion to exploit them for acts of labor or sex. It is a form of modern-day slavery and California consistently has the highest human trafficking rates with 1,224 cases reported in 2020 and 1,507 cases reported in 2019. With our “stand” and our signs, we are calling attention to this tragedy that occurs even here in the city in which we live. If this issue speaks to you, please join us as we take our “stand” **tomorrow, Mon, Sep 26th** (meet on the church patio at 8:15 a.m.). Signs and brochures are provided. Questions? Meet International Peacemaker, the Rev. Julie Kandema - Presbyterian Women of the Presbyterian Church of Los Gatos (16575 Shannon Rd, LG) will host the Rev. Kandema in PCLG’s Fellowship Hall; **Thurs, Oct 6th** (10 – 11:30 a.m.). All are welcome

The Rev. Julie Kandema, of the Presbyterian Church in Rwanda, one of 10 peacemakers from around the world, will be visiting churches in the Presbytery in early October. There will be an opportunity to hear her speak about the process of rebuilding and reuniting Rwandans following the genocide by the Hutu people against the minority Tutsi people in 1994.

Rev. Julie Kandema – RWANDA is an ordained Minister from the Presbyterian Church in Rwanda. Since 2014 she has served as Vice President and deputy legal representative for the denomination. She leads the church program in charge of Church Growth, supervising church activities related to evangelization, women and youth activities, deacons and Sunday School. She serves on a variety of commissions for peace building at the national and international levels. As Vice President of the Interfaith Platform for Dignity and Peace, she organizes inter-religious dialogues and other activities on peace and reconciliation. She looks forward to sharing with the Presbyterian Church (USA) her experience of the genocide against the Tutsi people of Rwanda in 1994. She will also share the efforts of the church in post-genocide Rwanda and the work done by different categories of people, particularly women and youth, to bring about true reconciliation and development in Rwanda.

Are you a “sew-er”? If so, sewing *Little Dresses for Africa* is for you. *Little Dresses for Africa* is a 501c3 Christian organization that provides relief to children in Africa where the dresses are distributed through orphanages, schools, and churches, to plant in the hearts of the girls that they are worthy. “Sew-ers” will work on the dresses at home and bring them to the church office **on or before Mon, Oct 17th**. If you’ve participated before, you know how to make these simple cotton peasant-style elastic neck dresses.
