During March, **Worship**, **Taizé**, and friends are serving coffee & refreshments after worship.

Welcome Guests and Visitors! We hope you already feel at home among us here at Stone Church. The nearest **restroom** is located between the Sanctuary and the Social Hall; exit thru the double doors at the front of the Sanctuary (near the TV). Everyone is invited for **refreshments** and fellowship in the Social Hall and on the patio after worship. We welcome the sound of any little ones during worship, but if your baby (age 0-3) gets too wiggly for you, you may take them to the **Nursery**,

located in the hallway between the Sanctuary and the Social Hall. It's open each Sunday for children ages 0-3.

<u>Children's Church School</u> – Children meet in the Fireside Room at 9:30 am (stone building on the other side of the Social Hall). Children will come to the sanctuary to participate in Communion.

<u>Each Week, Stone Church Invites You to Share Holy Communion</u> - We use the intinction method, dipping the bread in the cup—amber is juice, dark red is wine. When the time comes, we will process down the center aisle; take bread (in cup or cut – gluten free avail) and dip; the server will say a few words; partake of the moistened bread; return to your seat by the side aisles.

<u>Today the Unity Candle</u> is at **St. Philips Presbyterian Church - Salinas** (Elder Rick Sabillo). Each week the unity candle travels to a different church in the San Jose Presbytery; please pray for all God's people in this congregation.

<u>Guest Pastor Today</u> - Rev. Paul Trudeau is the founder and CEO of City Hope San Francisco. Originally from Oregon and Louisiana, Paul moved to San Francisco in 2005 to serve at City Church San Francisco, under Rev. Fred Harrell. Prior to his current role, Paul also served as chaplain in the San Francisco County Jail. Paul is a graduate of Reformed Theological Seminary (MA - Biblical Studies) and San Jose State University (BA, Art), and is ordained in the RCA (Reformed Church in America).

<u>Choir Music</u> – Today's choral music comes from two very different sources, the British choral tradition and the African American hymnody, and both envision places of peace, freedom, and joy.

Introit: *Jerusalem*, features music by Sir Hubert Parry (1848-1918). and text from English poet and engraver William Blake (.1757-1827). Blake is well known for his "Songs of Innocence and Experience," and for his use of visionary and mystic imagery in both his written and visual art. The text of our introit centers around a desire to rebuild a mythical holy city "in England's green and pleasant land." The title refers to the ancient city of Jerusalem, which is considered a holy place to three religions: Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. Its history is long, and fraught with conflict to this day. Blake's vision of rebuilding such a holy place in England must have inspired the English composer Sir Hubert Parry. Both Parry and Blake shared a radical (for their eras) distrust of organized religion, so the shining visions of a "new" Jerusalem, penned by his countryman from centuries prior, arises with Parry's eloquent melody and uplifting harmony. Parry counted among his composition students Ralph Vaughan Williams, Edward Elgar, and Gustav Holst. The setting of "Jerusalem" is familiar to many from the film, "Chariots of Fire."

Anthem: *Deep River* is a traditional African American "spiritual," a song that expresses the hopes and struggles of enslaved people. The text refers to the "river of life" which is deep and wide and indicates the author's desire to leave this world and "cross over" to the other side, referred to in this anthem as "campground." The beautiful melody paints, in musical tones, the placid and calm surface of a river, with its currents of life flowing richly underneath. The vision of joy longed for at the "gospel feast where all is peace" is at the heart of this poignant spiritual. The song was another one of the "code songs" for the underground railroad, (with its references to "crossing over" and "going to the campground, gospel feast," etc.). The song's arranger, Dr. J. Jefferson Cleveland (1937-1986), was an African American music scholar, famous for editing the definitive collection of spirituals in the "Songs of Zion" hymnbook.

<u>The Liturgical Arts Group</u> is hosting the coffee hour this morning and commemorating Mr. Fred Rogers (1928-2003), composer, writer, ordained Presbyterian minister, and host of nearly 900 episodes of 'Mr. Roger's Neighborhood' on PBS. He famously changed his tennis shoes at the beginning of each program and put on a cardigan sweater (most having been knitted for him at the beginning by his mom in Latrobe, PA (outside of Pittsburgh, where he was born and raised).

<u>Adult Ed</u> – (11 am, SA) Steve Nelson gives our final presentation in the Beatitudes series. Overall, this series offered each speaker's personal understanding of the eight Beatitudes – foundational teachings by Jesus spoken to his disciples and crowds early in his ministry. Often neglected in sermons and courses of study because they are either too obvious or too confusing, the Beatitudes are neither! Come, explore some deeper understanding of these words of Jesus.

<u>Men's Book Group</u> meets tomorrow, Mon, Mar 17<sup>th</sup> (7 pm) in the Lincoln House (office) Conference Room, to discuss "Jesus Wars" by Phillip Jenkins. All men are welcome; even if you haven't read it, come anyway, for the conversation, wine & snacks.
