## A Letter from Your Pastor

Dearest Congregation,

Recently I attended a gathering for pastors, and while we were checking in with one another, one of my colleagues remarked that he felt like he was rushing to plan Advent, which is ironic because Advent is a season of waiting. All the pastors around the table had a good laugh at this because jokes are funny when they are so painfully true. It is ironic that planning a season of waiting would be done hurriedly, but it's not unexpected.

As I reflect on this, I realize that so much of our lives is spent hurrying up, just so that we can wait. On the freeway, we hurry down stretches of relatively clear road, just to come upon standstill traffic, and be forced to wait. At the grocery store, we hurry through the aisles collecting everything we need just to wait in an impossibly long checkout line. When preparing for a party, we hurry to get everything done, just so we can wait for our guests to arrive. When preparing for a big decision or change, we hurry to weigh the pros and cons and work out all the details, just so that we can wait for a sign or a door to open.

This got me thinking: how might we stop this pendulum swing, hurry and

wait...hurry and wait, and find some sense of equilibrium and stability? I believe there is some semblance of an answer in the way we wait. Are we anxiously biting our nails, checking our watch, and cursing everything that gets in the way of accomplishing what we're trying to accomplish? If so, then we are likely liable to continue that pendulum path, where we experience very little joy in our movements.

I confess that I am devilishly excited for Christmas. I cannot wait to give and receive gifts, to enjoy holiday treats, to be immersed in the children's live nativity scene, to gather for a still and contemplative service late on the eve of Christmas, and to rejoice at the coming of Christ. As I prepare to enter into the Advent season, however, I am conscious of the fact that I don't want to hurry through any of it. I don't want to ride that pendulum, because I know the swinging will rob me of the joy and hope this season holds.

During this season of Advent, I am feeling an invitation to resist the urge to hurry, and instead, to seek to fully welcome the waiting. I am thinking of a number of ways to do this: take a hike and breathe in the love of the trees; seek stillness and meditation at a Taizé worship service; intentionally

### **Anointing with Prayer**

The pastors of Stone Church have renewed the practice of anointing with prayer following Sunday morning services; at present it is offered once a month, on the second Sunday following communion Sunday.

Anointing is an ancient Biblical tradition. Kings, prophets, and priests were anointed, usually by pouring fragrant oil over the head. We don't use oil; instead, we used a fragrant balm, drawing the sign of the cross on a person's forehead.



Anointing, as we use it, is an indication of God's constant grace, and God's blessings. Through anointing, persons who are distressed, or confused, or uncertain about situations in life are reminded that God's Spirit is constantly at hand to offer confidence and hope. The concerns are lifted to God in a short prayer, asking for God's Spirit to clarify the way ahead, and to bring comfort in the days ahead.

Anointing is offered to any person worshipping at Stone Church. It is not magic. It is an opportunity to ask God for a moment of peace, and to be reassured that God's Spirit is present in all our daily lives.

On Saturday, November 2, 2019, the fifth Sew-in Day for Little Dresses for Africa was underway in the Stone Church social hall. Sewing machines hummed and sew-ers chatted as they created colorful cotton dresses for little girls in Africa...dresses that will plant seeds of hope in their little-girl hearts.



Some came to sew, some sewed at home, but by the end of the morning 16 dresses had been completed and with 15 dresses already completed beforehand, our total to date is 31. Again at this year's sew-in, we remembered Evelyn Tower, who had encouraged us to participate in this project, and is no longer with us. She was remembered as we worked and we are thankful for her skills and gifts that she shared so willingly.



Little Dresses for Africa is a registered non-profit 501c3 Christian organization begun in 2008 by Rachel O'Neill. Its home base is in Rockwood, Michigan, where the dresses are sent. From there they are sent with mission groups; mailed directly; shipped in containers; taken personally to Africa and other locations around the world.

Little Dresses for Africa, as an organization, also promotes clean water, sanitation, good health, and family skills.

### Building Fellowship at Rebuilding Together Silicon Valley

This fall our project was for a homeowner who was born and raised in San Jose. She grew up in Goosetown, a district in present day Willow Glen. It was once distinguished for undergoing diverse ethnic transformations – from predominantly Irish to German and later to Italian over the course of decades. Our homeowner graduated from San Jose High School and was ready to attend San Jose State but met and married her husband, deciding instead to stay home and raise a family. Her husband served in the U.S. Navy where he transported troops to Guadalcanal in the Pacific Theater. The couple raised a son and a daughter. After returning from the War, her husband worked as a City employee and concrete finisher while she worked in the canneries 12 hours a night for 30 years to support her family. She is deeply familyoriented and regards her home as a castle, evident by the large living and backyard spaces she and her husband poured their love and labor into.

Though the homeowner lost her husband, her daughter to pancreatic cancer, and her son to a heart attack, she is living life well with her four dogs, and gets frequent visits from her son-in-law and grandson who live nearby.

She has always loved gardening and, despite having rheumatoid arthritis, still gardens vegetables out of barrels today.

### **Session Reports**

Below is a summary of the Session meeting held on October 15, 2019:

- Approved the annual Presbyterian Women Thank Offering for November.
- Approved a SUPER SPECIAL TOP SECRET ITEM that just proves you should have accepted that Nominating Committee offer. Too late now though. Next year.
- Approved a StoneWorks request for funds to assist our Accompaniment Team family as they transition into self-sufficiency after the loss of their breadwinner.
- Approved moving forward on initial plans for the Lincoln House foundation and windows.

#### **Committee Reports**

- Buildings & Grounds is organizing an upcoming workday, while handling a variety of repair and maintenance needs from lighting to pest control to dishwasher leaks.
- Membership & Communications is busy planning upcoming events like Game Night, Thanksgiving Dinner, a new member class, and the upcoming Presbytery meeting. They are also working on a special Veterans Reflections project for Veterans Day.
- Worship continues working to support our beautiful sanctuary and inspiring services. They have interviewed four potential organists and are arranging auditions.

- Personnel & Administration is organizing staff reviews of all paid employees.
- Men's Mission & Ministry continues to organize workdays (Camp Daybreak, Rebuilding Together, private homes), outreach (Men's Breakfast, Book Group), and fundraising (used book sales, wine tasting & auction).
- Presbyterian Women is making arrangements for mission partners to engage in our social hour, one group per month, rather than one annual mission fair. PW continues to organize events like Human Trafficking stands, book clubs, and Little Dresses for Africa.
- StoneWorks is planning an upcoming Solidarity training, and continues to work with the accompaniment team for the family of Alfredo while refining StoneWorks policies towards future accompaniment teams. SW approved donations to help survivors of Hurricane Dorian, as well as to support Sunday Friends and the Presbytery General Mission fund.
- Deacons has instituted twoperson teams for home visits and has made it easier to request confidentiality on the prayer chain.
- Stewardship is busily planning for the upcoming stewardship campaign, with Consecration Sunday on November 3.

## Below is a summary of the Session meeting held on November 19, 2019:

After approving items on the consent docket, Session:

 Set the annual congregational meeting for January 2, 2020, a

- Sunday, to approve terms of call and review the budget for 2020.
- Approved the serving of Communion monthly in 2020 (this is an annual vote of Session.)
- Approved a grant proposal for Rev. Sharon LeClaire's work in ministry and mental health.
- Approved an update to Rev. Sharon LeClaire's job description as Part-Time Stated Supply Pastor, which includes an increase in duties and a corresponding increase in compensation (pending Budget Review Committee negotiations).
- Approved an accounting change to the annual end-of-year office celebration, now to be hosted by P&A.
- After extensive discussion about effects to the backyard stemming from the expected elevation of Lincoln House and its impact on ADA access ramps, voted to postpone the item to next meeting.

#### **Committee Reports**

- Budget & Finance reports both income and expenses in a good position. They are busy prepping for the upcoming Budget Review process for 2020.
- Buildings & Grounds reports a very successful workday (thanks volunteers!) and is organizing lighting replacement and several cleaning projects for the winter season.
- Deacons reports a busy time for Stone Cares supporting members of the congregation in various transitions. They are planning for Parents' Day Out on 12/7.

- Membership & Communications celebrated the publication of the special issue of interviews with Stone Church Veterans. In addition to regular business (including StoneNews and weekend hikes), M&C is busy organizing the Thanksgiving potluck and the upcoming Presbytery meeting. They also report the receiving of eight new members at the recent new members' class.
- Christian Education heard reports from the various Sunday School levels, which are blessed with many volunteers. They are already planning for relocations due to upcoming Lincoln House construction.
- StoneWorks can't stop giving away money; this month, to Immanuel House, Rapid Response Network, Black Lives Matter, and Covenant Network. They helped win a Synod grant for a computer lab for Sunday Friends. They are addressing options

for the rotating shelter given upcoming Lincoln House construction. They are also exploring a new role for the Accompaniment

Team.

- **Stewardship** reports 106 pledges for \$390,000 to date. Expectations are that more pledges will roll in over upcoming weeks, with a forecast around \$495,000. This would be comparable to recent pledge totals (2019 budgeted for \$490,000, but traditionally this is a discount on the total pledge amount). Please get your pledge in as soon as possible, even if it's an estimate.
- Worship is working towards Advent (including additional Taize services) and the Interfaith Thanksgiving service, and at the time of their meeting were planning the

- Veterans' Day Sunday service. Liturgical Arts has created new green banners for the sanctuary and is working on the fourth Great Ends banner. Also heard reports on the organist search (ongoing).
- Personnel & Administration heard pastor reports, and has gathered employee reviews and prepared recommendations for 2020 salaries.
- Presbyterian Women reported a successful first run of the Community Mission Table during social hour. They will be collecting the traditional Thank Offering near Thanksgiving.

#### **Trailwalkers**

Our most recent hike was at Rancho San Antonio Open Space Preserve.

We took in the gentle Lower Meadow trail to Deer Hollow Farm, then the Wildcat Loop trail to the Vista point and back along the Lower Meadow

> trail, for a total distance of about four miles. This was our last trek for the year – but we have a great 2020 schedule planned!

## Stone Church Vets Honored on Veterans Day

On November 10, 2019, Stone Church honored the many vets in our congregation with scripture, sermon, and song. As is our tradition, we invited veterans to gather on the patio steps for a group photo. This year, we also celebrated the publication of a special collection of reflections from our veterans. Reflections of Service captures some of the service memories of our vets and how their time in the military has been reflected in service during other periods of their lives. Read their stories here.

From the collection's Introduction:

Since our founding in 1947, Stone
Church has had a storied history of
service: to our church community, to our
neighbors near and far, and to our
country. What better reflection of our
members' commitment to service than
recognizing the veterans in our
membership. Our veterans served in
every branch: Army, Navy, Air Force,
Marines, Coast Guard, and National
Guard; some served short periods, some
served entire careers. Some were called
to serve abroad, and others were called
to serve at home.

In addition to the sacrifices made by our veterans, their families -- spouses, parents, children, relatives -- often made their own sacrifices as well.

Whether in the combat zone or not, long separations created hardships on spouses, stress in children and anxiety for parents of service members who may have been in harm's way. Even in peace time and non-combat areas, training accidents often claim the lives of military personnel because the nature of their jobs and training can be dangerous, as can be observed in some of the writings.



Our veterans served in World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War and the

Gulf Wars; however, many served in critical non-combat roles both in the U.S. and abroad. Of those who were deployed overseas, our veterans saw nearly twenty countries spanning five continents. Upon completing their time in service, our veterans pursued a variety of occupations, regularly drawing upon their military experience as they continued to serve in civilian life: a fireman, a teacher, a counselor, a banker, a

principal, an engineer, a tech exec, a programmer, an entrepreneur, an artist, a business owner, a sales professional, a physical therapist, and ultimately, all became Stone Church Members. We gratefully acknowledge their service, and their ongoing devotion to the service mission of Stone Church.

## Sara Holtzapple

Sara and husband Rev. Robert Holtzapple, came to Stone Church in 1998. She was a Deacon, a

member of what is now called StoneWorks, but at the time was called the Church & World Board, and was a faithful member of the Library Crew that tends the church library.

Her bio in Presbyterian Women's 2010 "Telling Stories of Faith" tell us that she enjoyed mission work; she and her husband participated in Civil Rights marches in Boston, worked for fair housing, and, in general, worked to better their communities wherever they lived.

One of her lasting legacies here at Stone will be the beautiful piano she donated that now resides in the sanctuary. She will be remembered every time it is played.

Two of her favorite Bible passages on her journey were, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, your soul, and your strength, and "love your neighbor as yourself," and "Do unto others as you would want them to do unto you."

### June Tablak

June and her husband, Ed (aka Tab), joined Stone Church on December 25, 1956.

June was very involved in the life and history of this church, serving in numerous leadership roles over the years. She also was active in Presbyterian Women, and volunteering in the community.

At her memorial service, several highlights of June's life were shared:

- She was the first Editor of the Stone Wall News until she moved back east in 1969.
- She was the third woman elected as an Elder at Stone Church (1962).
- She led the Junior High program at Stone beginning in the fall of 1960 (90-120 kids would meet on Thursday nights.) She took that up again in the 80s when she and Tab returned to San Jose ('77). This program filled a huge need for the junior high kids.
- She wrote the Church Mouse column from 1983-2017.
- She served on the Membership Board since 1978 or so, through its name changes and other shifts until 2014.
- She started the Family Clusters
   Program in the 1980s which created
   groups of families who met together
   regularly. One cluster group still
   meets to this day.

- She attended the Women's Retreat for about 28 years, serving on the planning team several times.
- She helped to form and foster the Soul Feast groups until she was 97 years old.
- In the 196os, June worked in the local community with the "braceros"

   Mexican people who worked in the fields. Taking her girls with her, she traveled to their location and helped women learn to sew and also helped some learn English. She majored in Spanish in college.
- At age 88 she started volunteering at Sacred Heart, where she would get up almost every Tuesday and Thursday morning to be at the facility by 7am to make sandwiches and prepare food for the hungry. One Saturday each month she helped distribute food at Sacred Heart.
- Twice, June and Tab were foster parents, once for a boy and once for a girl; both children were in high school.
- June was deeply rooted and raised in a staunchly conservative,
   Republican family and nurtured in a fundamentalist Methodist church and emerged into a theological, social and political progressive of the highest order, exemplified in a book group she initiated 30 years ago.

June was welcoming to everyone. She enjoyed meeting new people and hearing about what they were doing. She was an excellent hostess and many people have spent an evening around her table, feeling welcome, and meeting new people.

June was a pivotal piece of Stone Church, its history, and part of its guiding light. There are so many people of this church and our community that she has touched. She will be missed by all.

Here are a few lines from Stone Church's mission statement that represent June well:

"... the warm heart, the open mind, the adventurous spirit

That cares, heals, comforts, challenges;

That knows no division of color or class or frontier;

That inquires and looks forward as well as backward."



# Church leaders give PC(USA)'s revitalization process solid reviews

LOUISVILLE — As 14 Presbyteries prepare to launch the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A)'s Vital Congregations initiative in January, three presbyteries — Trinity, Newark and **San Jose** — are finishing up a pilot program of the two-year revitalization process.

The Presbyterian Mission Agency initiative led by Vital Congregations (VC) coordinator the Rev. Dr. Kathryn

Threadgill prayerfully walks with pastors and congregations through intentional efforts of revitalization by focusing on these 7 Marks of Congregational Vitality: lifelong discipleship formation; intentional, authentic evangelism; outward incarnational focus; empower servant leadership;

spirit-inspired worship; caring relationships; and ecclesial health.

In the **Presbytery of San Jose**, the 10 congregations in the VC pilot have about six months left in the revitalization process. For the presbytery's VC coordinator, the Rev. Dr. Margaret Boles, it's been a delight seeing 15 pastors representing 13 churches meeting in monthly cohort groups.

"It feels like gold, because relationships are being strengthened and ideas are being shared," she said. "It has created such good energy in both the presbytery and its churches."

At Trinity Presbytery in South Carolina, 10 of the presbytery's 61 churches went through the pilot VC initiative. The first launch was so successful that they held an orientation in October for another 10 churches interested in going through the second wave of the revitalization process. At that gathering, pastors of the churches who had gone through the initiative became table facilitators, sharing both their successes and struggles in going through the intentional revitalization efforts.

According to Trinity VC coordinator Dr. Phyllis Sanders, the pastors who have already been through the pilot program will continue to meet quarterly in their cohort groups to discuss ways that they're continuing to live out the seven marks of congregational vitality.

"Otherwise it becomes a one-shot deal, like a project, rather than a continuing process of transformation," said Trinity's general presbyter, the Rev. Danny C. Murphy.

For Boles, pastor of Covenant Presbyterian Church in Palo Alto, California, the richness of the VC process is what makes it so meaningful to participating churches. After the first year, the initiative encourages churches to celebrate their history — which Covenant did, taking files from 70 years of life together and laying them out in a missional timeline.

"It was so much fun and so positive for the congregation," she said. "We left it up for a month."

For other churches in the presbytery Boles heard from, both celebrating their history and also being encouraged to do a prayer walk in their neighborhood helped create a new sense of purpose and meaning.

One of the final steps during the second year of the initiative is taking the U.S. Congregational Life Survey to help each congregation assess how

they're doing in each of the seven

Trinity's Sanders has seen how helpful this is in helping churches continue to explore their strengths while working on areas that need attention. For example, McGregor Presbyterian Church in Columbia, South Carolina has been working on "intentional, authentic evangelism," which was its lowest-scoring mark.

"And now they're beginning to restructure what they do around all the marks," Sanders said.

Wanting to more fully live into the mark of "outward incarnational focus" by getting out of the walls of their church and into the neighborhood, Shiloh First Presbyterian Church in Winnsboro, South Carolina, held a Jazz on the Green event. When it was moved indoors to a local community center because of inclement weather, the church's pastor, the Rev. Dr. Robert Scotland, had artificial turf placed in the area where the band played.

"It was a great neighborhood and ecumenical gathering, with children from both the church and community participating," Scotland said.

At Newark Presbytery the Rev. Dr. Barbara Smith, transitional director of presbytery ministries, says going through the VC pilot initiative was "a win for them." When the churches started the revitalization process, she admits that the presbytery wasn't in a good place. But because of the pastor cohort group they are doing much better.

"Which in our context is just as valuable as what has happened in the other pilot presbyteries," she said.

Some 24 pastors and church leaders in Newark Presbytery participated in the cohort groups. Of the 19 responding to a survey at the end of the process, 14 said they would probably (6) or definitely (8) participate in future cohorts. Of the 10 participating congregations, three-quarters of those responding said they would be somewhat comfortable talking with others about the seven marks.

Now when churches apply for grants, Smith says the presbytery asks them — whether they participated in the VC pilot or not — how their project fits in with the seven marks as a way of helping the churches in the presbytery start talking about the marks.

Boles said the one thing the Vital Congregations revitalization process does is raise awareness of what God is already doing — and for congregations to enter into that.

"It's raised all of our awareness," she said. "Members of our presbytery who aren't in the pastor cohort groups are learning about the things we're talking about — and you begin to see the ripple effects."

Presbyterian Mission Agency's Threadgill is grateful for the faithful work done by the three pilot presbyteries on behalf of the PC(USA) and the initiative.

"I want to acknowledge the significance of their pioneer work for the denomination," she said. "By boldly doing their work, through the Spirit's power, they are bringing about transformation and revitalization within their congregations today. This is a great celebration to us all."
