The Second Lesson

Acts 17: 16-34 (N.T., p. 137)

While Paul was waiting for them in Athens, he was deeply distressed to see that the city was full of idols. So he argued in the synagogue with the Jews and the devout persons, and also in the market-place every day with those who happened to be there. Also some Epicurean and Stoic philosophers debated with him. Some said, 'What does this babbler want to say?' Others said, 'He seems to be a proclaimer of foreign divinities.' (This was because he was telling the good news about Jesus and the resurrection.) So they took him and brought him to the Areopagus and asked him, 'May we know what this new teaching is that you are presenting? It sounds rather strange to us, so we would like to know what it means.' Now all the Athenians and the foreigners living there would spend their time in nothing but telling or hearing something new.

Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, 'Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, "To an unknown god." What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For "In him we live and move and have our being"; as even some of your own poets have said,

"For we too are his offspring."

Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead.'

When they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some scoffed; but others said, 'We will hear you again about this.' At that point Paul left them. But some of them joined him and became believers, including Dionysius the Areopagite and a woman named Damaris, and others with them.



Welcome Guests and Visitors! We hope you already feel at home among us here at Stone Church. The nearest **restroom** is located between the Sanctuary and the Social Hall; exit thru the double doors at the front of the Sanctuary (near the TV). Everyone is invited for refreshments and fellowship in the Social Hall and on the patio after worship. We welcome the sound of any little ones during

worship, but if your baby (age 0-3) gets too wiggly for you, you may take them to the **Nursery**, located in the hallway between the Sanctuary and the Social Hall. It's open each Sunday for children ages 0-3.

<u>Stone Church Invites All People</u> to share in Holy Communion. We use the intinction method, dipping the bread in the cup—amber is juice, dark red is wine. When the time comes, we will process down the center aisle; take bread (in cup or cut – gluten free avail) and dip; the pastor will say a few words; partake of the moistened bread; return to your seat by the side aisles.

Communion has been expanded and will be served each Sunday, with a few exceptions: June 9, 16, 23, and 30.

Communion food collection – on the 1st Sunday of the month we collect food/goods for Sacred Heart.

Sermon Theme Today – We are all God's Offspring, Knowing this changes everything.

<u>Flowers</u> – This week Diane has prepared long stemmed roses for all. Pick one up in the Social Hall after worship.

Children Sing in worship today. Meet Amber on the patio or Fireside Room.

<u>Vacation Church School</u> – There is still space available, for the "Knights of the North Castle!" themed week (**June 17**th – **21**st [8:45am – Noon]). Email Amber to register (<u>amber_biscardi@stonechurch.org</u>) and have your ex-tended family, friends, and neighbors sign up, too!

<u>Anointing ~ 2nd Sundays</u> – **Today** after worship, come up to the front of the Sanctuary (near the piano) for anointing from Rev. Dr. David McCreath; an opportunity for a moment of personal prayer and anointing. Anointing, an ancient practice that continues in today's churches, originally used to designate public leaders, such as kings, or used as part of a healing process for illnesses. At Stone Church, it is used as a symbol of God's grace, an act calling forth the Holy Spirit, a way of demonstrating the presence of God, of the desire of God that we find peace and comfort.

<u>Men's Book Group</u> meets **Mon, May 20th** (7 pm) at Jim Hagan's, 1431 Hamilton Way, SJ, to discuss "Elon Musk" by Walter Isaacson. All men welcome, even if you haven't read it, for the conversation, wine & snacks.

The committee thanks the congregation for their participation. More than 47% of the 266 surveys sent out were returned, which church survey experts say is excellent! The survey provides important info, to be combined with other research and congregational outreach, that will be reflected in Stone Church's Mission Study Report, expected to be completed this summer.
